A few tips to make your visit a great success:

Fearful dogs:

If your dog is very fearful/stressed in general, please contact us before your visit. We'll prescribe PVP's (Pre-Visit Pharmaceuticals), medications that aim to reduce the stress and fear associated with veterinary visits.

On the road:

If your dog is stressed in the car or not coping with the journey (e.g. vomiting), please don't hesitate to contact us. We'll be happy to provide you with something to make the car journey more pleasant for your little loulou.

On arrival:

If your dog is afraid of people, strangers or is stressed at the vet's, don't hesitate to wait in your car or outside until it's your turn.

In the waiting room:

Your PalleVet veterinary practice has a waiting room dedicated to dogs. When you arrive, the vet will ask you to let go of your dog after checking that all the doors are closed. This allows your dog to get to know its new surroundings and relax.

Treats:

During our consultations, we spoil our patients with lots of treats. If your dog is rather fussy, don't give him anything to eat before the visit and don't hesitate to bring his favourite treats. If your dog has a food allergy or is on a special diet, don't forget to bring his usual kibbles/treats.

After all, the aim of every visit is to get dogs to associate their visit to the vet with eating the treats and forget about the treatment in general.

Fear Free" consultations:

Certified "Fear Free", we do our utmost to minimise any stress and maximise the positive experience of visiting our practice. Health permitting, we are sometimes led to interrupt a procedure when we see that your dog's stress, fear and discomfort exceed a certain threshold. In these cases, the procedure will be postponed and rescheduled.

For your information: If the procedure for which you have booked an appointment cannot be carried out that day, you will be billed for a "Happy Visite" consultation. The new consultation will then be replaced by a simple check-up visit.

On discharge:

We make every effort to avoid unnecessary stress. If the next patient is already in the waiting room, you can leave the practice by another exit without having to go through the waiting room and meet the other dog.
